What is the Sports Premium funding?

The Government is providing funding to improve provision of physical education (PE) and sport in primary school. The sport funding can only be spent on sport and PE provision in schools. OFSTED will play a significant role in ensuring that schools target this funding in areas which will lead to clear outcomes in raising standards and opportunities in PE and school sport for all children throughout the Primary Phase. Wells Primary School receives £16,000 plus £10 per pupil premium. In 2022/23 Wells Primary School received £18,869

Purpose of funding:

Schools will have to spend the sport funding on improving their provision of PE and sport through:

- Hiring specialist PE teachers or qualified sports coaches to work alongside primary teachers when teaching PE
- New or additional sport clubs
- Paying for professional development opportunities in PE/sport
- Providing cover to release primary teachers for professional development in PE/sport
- Running sport competitions, or increasing participation in school games
- Buying quality assured professional development modules or materials in PE/sport
- Providing places for pupils in after school clubs and holiday clubs
